You may have heard the story by now.

A few years ago, Ted Mettetal was standing in a grocery store aisle stocking up on water for a mission trip when a thought occurred to him: Was there a bottled water company dedicating its profits to helping people in developing countries get access to clean water?

Mettetal, a family doctor and longtime partner with Lakeland Medical Associates in Athens, did some investigating and discovered there was no such company. So in February of 2010, with the help of a dedicated group of people, he launched Hope Springs Water. Since then, five wells have been

"If we're able to make life better for just one person, I think we've done something good," said Mettetal. "But we've impacted the lives of far more than that."

Using 100 percent of its profits, Hope Springs Water partners with communities in developing countries to help provide sources of pure drinking water. Thanks to a monetary gift from the Trinity Valley Community College student senate, Hope Springs was able to fund three wells in Nicaragua in 2010. This past year, the company drilled a well in Uganda and contributed to the drilling of another in the mountains of Mexico.

"About a year ago, I received an email from a young man who wrote, 'I would like to know how to find Hope Springs Water," recalled Mettetal. "I told him what stores to go to. He emails back and says, 'In my village in Uganda, we don't have a grocery store. We need your help."

That village was Bunyagira, home to about 650 people on a mountainside in Eastern Central Uganda where diseases like cholera, typhoid and malaria were common and infant mortality high.

"Is it hard work? Absolutely," said Mettetal. "Is it late nights and early mornings? Yes. Is it worth it? Absolutely, it is."

Hope Springs went to work, and the well was completed this past September. The joy felt by the village was expressed in an email by the teacher at Bunyagira's small school.

"We are so grateful for the clean water Hope Springs brought to our community," wrote Grace Nakaye Ritah. "We get more than 20 people every day coming from the neighboring villages to draw water from [our] clean water source. ... Our children are now free from waterborne diseases Thank you for the hope you brought to Bunyagira."
